- Toileting difficulties
- Hygiene
- Bullying, Hate Speech, Cursing
- Religion and Politics
- Drugs and Alcohol

Can you give me some examples?

- Public masturbation
- Women aren't as smart as men
- There is fecal matter spread on the bathroom walls
- Strong body odor, loud farts, belching through tests
- Democrats, republicans, conservatives, progressives, communists, libertarians are idiots
- Can you keep a secret?

What doesn't work?

- Making assumptions, getting angry, negative reinforcement
- Extinction methods, restraint
- Venting to colleagues
- Shame, embarrassment, singling someone out


- Situation assessment


- Open and curious



Uncomfortable and Awkward Family Situations

- A parent relays they found pornography on their child's computer
- A student got into a fight and used hate speech
- A parent is speaking negatively about their child in front of their child
- A parent asks you to keep something secret
- You are filing a DFCS report

Why is this uncomfortable?

- Lack of education or training for professionals
- Fear of shaming or embarrassing family and student
- Fear of reaction from family
- Not an expert on the child, family, or situation at hand
- Myths, generalizations and stereotypes of race, ethnicity, culture
- Personal values, morals, norms, and beliefs

Safety, Respect and Empathy, Communication, Education

Safety

- Assess situation
- Prioritize basic functioning and needs
- Follow professional ethical guidelines

Respect and empathy

Maintain a non-judgemental and positive regard

Communication

- Collaborate and be direct
- Communicate frequently and clearly

Education

Provide relevant and factual information

Safety

- Situation assessment
 - Prioritize immediate needs
- Follow professional code and guidelines
- Utilize Crisis Resources
- Community Resources

Respect and Empathy

- Non-judgemental and positive regard

 - Individualized support


Looking back personally, I needed a personal relationship, like for me, I felt like when you're on a different path with your kid, you know I came with there was more of a traumatic history, my son's being kicked out of places, you feel like you're kid's not being accepted in the world, you're very fearful for the future, that I needed—I think the parent is coming in very vulnerable, or at least for me, that's how I felt, and I felt my son was vulnerable. People coming to you in vulnerability, I think we have to feel that basic floortime level of self-regulating with you and feeling engaged warmth, so that it doesn't feel so clinical. I guess what I'm trying to say like that somehow there feels that it's a balanced relationship.

I still think you have to figure out a way that a person feels they can be safe and not judged, and so that you can be open with each other, where are the struggles at home, so the parents don't have their defenses up, you know, we really want to be there to help you, from school to home, you have to—and I don't know if I have the answer on that, and maybe it's an individualized thing, maybe each parent needs it in a different way, but, yeah, I know for me from a parent perspective, if it feels too clinical, I could feel my own defenses come up, like why would I share about a really vulnerable hard moment if then all the teachers are going to sit around and talk about me. There's that feeling, so you want to feel like—we have to find a way to help parents just feel safe that this isn't about judging you, and that you're validating the parental experience, that yes it is hard, it is hard raising kids that have challenges.


